

Annual General 2021 Meeting of PSSL 2021

The membership of the Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka gathered on 10th December 2021 at the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists Meeting Room for its Annual General Meeting (AGM). Dr. Sanath Lanerolle, President PSSL welcomed all the members present at the AGM.

Secretary, Dr. Dilusha Atukorale read out the AGM minutes of the year 2020. The minutes were proposed to be in order by Prof. Dulani Gunasekara and seconded by Dr. Surantha Perera. Then-President Dr. Sanath Lanerolle discussed the matters arising from the minutes and other suggestions.

All the members congratulated Dr. Sanath Lanerolle and the team for the efforts and hard work during the COVID pandemic, to improve the perinatal outcome in Sri Lanka. The next item on the agenda was confirmation of new members of the PSSL who joined in 2021. Dr.Dilusha Atukorale, read out the names of the new members and Dr.Surantha Perera added a few more members who have registered through him. The members of the PSSL agreed to continue with the colour-coded E-card issuing for new members. Two new resolutions related to the Sri Lanka Journal of Perinatal Medicine were highlighted by Dr.Dilusha Atukorale. These were forwarded by the Editor in chief, Prof. Dulani Gunasekara, under Article 12.1.8.

The resolutions were:

- 1. Tenure of Editorial Board members the Board members will be appointed for 3 years
- Termination of membership if any member is absent for 3 consecutive Board meetings or has not contributed in any manner to the continuance of the journal, the Editor in Chief will have the right to terminate their membership in the Board, by informing the member concerned.

The membership of the PSSL agreed to the above resolutions.

 Dr. Sanath Lanerolle in his president's address stated the activities successfully concluded by the PSSL during the year 2021 amidst the COVID 19 pandemic and the lockdown. The following points were highlighted.

Dr. Sanath Lanerolle thanked Prof. Dulani Gunasekara for all the hard work of the Sri Lanka Journal of Perinatal Medicine. Special thank was also given to Dr.Dilusha Atukorale, secretary, Dr. Surantha Perera, Dr.Ruwan Silva, Prof Rasika Herath, Dr.Sharada Jayalath, Dr.Kaushalya Kasthuruarachchi, and Dr.Asiri Hewamalage. Dr. Sanath Lanerolle also thanked the sponsors, especially Zydus Company and Mr.Rajith, for providing the zoom facilities throughout the year. Miss Sandali and the staff of SLCOG were also thanked. As the next 2 items in the agenda, Dr.Dilusha Atukorale read the Secretary's Report, and Dr.Ruwan Silva read the Treasurer's Report for 2021.

The next agenda item was to appoint the PSSL Council for the year 2021. Before AGM applications were called for all the posts other than the post of President and President-elect. Election Committee appointed by the Council was headed by Prof. Dulanie Gunasekera. The new Council was appointed according to the nominations, and all were elected uncontested. Dr. Sanath Lanerolle wished the very best for the newly appointed Council and he extended his fullest support for all the future activities of the Society.

Dr. Saman Kumara, making his presidential address thanked the members for honoring him with this task. He stated that he will continue some of the activities done in the previous year and that he will maintain the high standards achieved by the previous Council. Dr.Saman Kumara highlighted the proposed activities during the year 2022, mainly concentrating on reducing neonatal mortality rates and problems related to prematurity. He also requested new suggestions and support from the Council. Induction of the 21st President of the Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka



The ceremonial induction of Dr. L.P.C.Saman Kumara as the 21st President of the Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka (PSSL) was held at the Lotus Ballroom of Shangri-La Hotel, Colombo on the 30th of January 2022. Dr. Saman Kumara, Consultant Neonatologist at Castle Street Hospital for Women is also the 1st Neonatologist to be appointed as a President of this prestigious society.

The ceremony was graced by the chief guest, Dr. Asela Gunawardena, Director General of Health Services, Ministry of Health Sri Lanka, Guest of honor Dr.Pushpa Punchihewa, senior consultant paediatrician and Special virtual guest Dr.Amit Gupta, Consultant Neonatologist from Oxford, United Kingdom. Venerable Aludeniye Subodhi Thero, the chief incumbent of Seruwila Mangala Rajamaha Viharaya, also graced the occasion on invitation by the newly elected president.

Many distinguished guests added colors to this special occasion in the history of perinatal medicine in Sri Lanka. Leading medical professionals of the country including members of Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (SLCOG), College of Community Physicians Sri Lanka (CCPSL), and Sri Lanka College of Paediatricians (SLCP) participated in the event. WHO, UNICEF, World Bank, and UNFPA representatives also participated as special invitees.

Following the ceremonial procession and lighting of the traditional oil lamp by distinguished guests and council members of the PSSL, the gathering was warmly welcomed by the outgoing president Prof Sanath Lanerolle. The President medal was awarded to new president Dr. Saman Kumara by outgoing president Prof. Sanath Lanerolle.

As the first speaker, Ven. Aludeniye Subodhi Thero, chief incumbent of Seruwila Mangala Rajamaha Viharaya congratulated Dr.Saman Kumara for being elected as the President of PSSL. Venerable thero, then introduced the "Save a Baby" fundraising project which was a massive









collaborative project of the Seuwila Mangala Rajamaha Viharaya and the PSSL. This project was to purchase special resuscitation machines, which will provide warm, humidified, blended gas to resuscitate premature newborns.

Following this introduction "Save a Baby" fundraising project was officially launched by Ven Aludeniye Subodhi Thero and Dr.Saman Kumara, amidst the prestigious gathering.

Dr.Pushpa Punchihewa, the guest of honour and also a mentor of Dr.Saman Kumara, addressing the gathering, expressed her heartiest congratulations to the newly elected president and the council. Dr.Punchihewa recalled the memories of Dr.Saman Kumara as one of her best trainees, giving examples of how he used his skills and expertise in managing critically ill children.

Then Dr.Amit Gupta, consultant neonatologist from Oxford, United Kingdom, speaking virtually, wished all the best for Dr.Saman Kumara and the council and stated that he will provide whatever support needed for the newly elected president to carry out his goals during the year 2022.

The chief guest Dr. Asela Gunawardena, Director General of Health Services, addressed the gathering and highlighted the collaborative work done by the Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka with the Ministry of Health, to uplift perinatal care in Sri Lanka.

attributed to prematurity and its complications, Dr. Saman Kumara said during this year most of the activities of the PSSL will be focused on effectively managing premature infants. He highlighted the major projects and activities that the society has planned for the year 2022, stating that he would be able to carry out these with the support of the new council.

The Vote of thanks was given by Dr. Dilusha Atukorale, Secretary of Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka. She thanked the members of the PSSL, for electing her as the secretary for the 2nd consecutive year. The Grand Ceremony was brought to a close as the procession left the hall and was followed by a reception.

CME program – Lectures on Neonatal Clinical Updates

Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka in collaboration with Ceylon Association of Neonatologist commenced a CME prgram to update and share the knowledge on neonatal care among Neonatologist, Paediatricians, Neonatal doctors, Nurses and Midwifes. Two lectures are scheduled monthly, focusing the doctors and the other medical staff separately. Already, four lectures were successfully conducted during January and February 2022 with excellent participation. An e–certificate with CME points will be granted to all the participants.









Overview of the activities planned for 2022

Perinatal excellence through a new evidence-based approach to premature labour and the baby

Our focus for this year is an evidence-based approach to the management of premature labour and the baby to reduce neonatal mortality due to prematurity. A recent survey carried out by the PSSL demonstrated that many premataure deaths are not centrally reported, and this makes our national neonatal mortality rate inaccurate. Until the present time, no one knew the gestation-specific mortality rate in our country. The survey demonstrated that we are losing almost 100% of 23 weeks babies. The most pathetic finding was that in this 21st century, we are still losing nearly 25% of 28 weeks babies. This is highly unacceptable. Almost all healthy 28 weekers should survive. Even most of 26 weekers can be managed and saved with available facilities in the The PSSL, under my presidency, decided to address this issue at the national level.

The first activity of the year was initiated during the induction ceremony and was witnessed by all of you. In Sri Lanka, we are still resuscitating our newborn babies in a very preliminary way which is bag and mask resuscitation. Science has advanced fast but unfortunately for the past decade, we have not moved with the rest of the world. Even a tiny micro-preemie is resuscitated or stabilized using an ordinary bag and mask ventilation with 100% oxygen. This not only damages very delicate lungs but also makes the baby hypothermic due to clod gas directly from a cylinder. In almost all the high-income counties, this is done with a T-piece resuscitator which gives blended gas with controlled pressure. The humidification of the gas flow is not done even in many rich countries like the UK, Australia but it's popular in the USA.

The PSSL has taken an important initiative to provide 100 such sophisticated resuscitation units to a selected group of hospitals all over the country.

These machines are provided completely through a charity project conducted by the "Seruwila Mangala Rajamaha Viharaya" in collaboration with the PSSL. We are almost completing the charity project within 3 weeks of its launching and the total budget is nearly 110 million. This latest intervention will have no burden on the Ministry of Health at all.

At this point, I would like to thank Ven. Aludeniye Subodhi Thero, the Chief incumbent of Seruwila Mangala Rajamaha Viharaya for tirelessly working towards this project and all who have contributed in many ways to make it successful. This will make a significant change in the outcome of premature babies in Sri Lanka.

Our next step is to provide a care package for mothers with threatened premature labour and premature baby. We have identified 11 interventions that should be offered to the mother and the baby. We have replicated these interventions from a successful project carried out in the UK to reduce mortality and morbidity due to prematurity (PERIPrem project). Most of these interventions are feasible even in our setup. These interventions will surely contribute to reducing mortality and morbidity in preterm babies in Sri Lanka.

We are planning provincial workshops to carry out all these activities. With the help of MOH we will conduct 9 workshops to cover all the 9 provinces of the country. I am planning to identify provincial leaders for each province to facilitate this training. These workshops will have an additional segment of perinatal mental health which will be conducted by psychiatrists and community consultants. We are planning our first workshop in the Southern province on 18th March 2022. I strongly believe this program will save thousands of premature babies in Sri Lanka.

The new council of the Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka, for the year 2022, was appointed at the Annual General Meeting held on the 10th of December 2021.

The official Presidential Induction Ceremony was held on the 30th of January 2022, under the patronage of the DGHS Dr. Asela Gunawardene, at the Lotus Ballroom, Hotel Shangrila. It was attended by more than 200 distinguished invitees including Past Presidents, Presidents of other Professional bodies, representatives of the Ministry of Health, WHO, UNFPA, and World Bank, friends, and colleagues.

"Save a Baby" fundraising project was launched at the Seruwila Mangala Rajamaha Viharaya, under the guidance of Venerable Aludeniye Subhodhi Thero, the chief incumbent of the temple, in collaboration with the Perinatal Society of Sri Lanka. This is a project to obtain 100 respiratory machines + inbuilt saturation monitor that deliver humidified, warm, and blended gas to resuscitate premature babies.

4 webinars each were held during January and February in collaboration with the Ceylon Association of Neonatologists.

The president along with a few council members met the DGHS a, Dr.Asela Gunawardene on February 21st at the ministry of health. This was a combined meeting with the Family Health Bureau, to discuss the projects and activities planned by the PSSL for 2022.

The 2nd council meeting was held on February 24th, 2022.
